Mission Statement

All Souls is a eucharistically centered cathedral whose life is formed by scripture, the baptismal covenant, and our engagement with the world about us. It is a community where all are welcome, trust is present, risks are taken, and where our gifts and graces enable us to be who God knows us to be.

About this Guide

I always find it interesting to see what kind of things people have on the walls of their homes and offices. For me, they serve as icons into the things that have particular meaning for those persons. It is not a coincidence that in my office you will find an icon of St. Catherine and Martin Luther King, Jr., a chalice, a picture of the altar and baptismal font at St. Andrew's in Jackson, Mississippi, a poster of The Blues Brothers, a poster of Mississippi Blues musicians, and various pictures of my family. All of these represent various moments that have formed and shaped me. They are experiences that have spoken to me about myself, the people in my life, the whole creation and how God is present to us.

Formation is a word that describes what it means to be growing in our relationship to God, to ourselves, and each other. Formation is the relationship between our life experience and the rituals/practices through which we see and understand those experiences. Family rituals and faith rituals give the context, the forming stories and experiences through which we see and learn. They connect us to our foundations and speak of our dreams. They tell us what is important to us and from where we have found hope and meaning as human beings.

I have often said that I cannot recall many lessons from my fourth grade Sunday School class, but I can tell you a whole lot about our teachers and remember vividly the occasions where we were invited into their homes for special events. I can't recall the lectionary lessons or sermons of any particular season growing up, yet I can tell you in vivid details how the church appeared on Christmas Eve, during Lent and that there was deep teaching in the experience of being allowed to fall asleep in my parent's lap at midnight services. I recall vividly a prayer vigil undergoing brain surgery.

This booklet is a guide of formation. It describes the ways, the practices and rituals through which we at All Souls Cathedral find God, each other and our own lives. They remind us that God comes to us in many and varied ways. They remind us that it is our chosen commitment to each other and to God, our chosen commitment to communal rhythms and rituals that leads us into the life, mystery and hope of God.

May this guide be a companion in your and our being "formed in Christ" (St. Paul). May it lead to a deeper connection to God and all of God's creation.

Worship and Children

Gospel for Children

During the gospel and sermon, at both the 9 a.m., and 11:15 a.m., services the children (ages 5 – 9) are invited to Children’s Chapel in the Owen Library. The crucifer leads them out just before the reading of the gospel, and they return at the Peace. Children’s Chapel is patterned after the main service and includes the gospel reading, short homily/discussion of the gospel, and instruction about worship and our church year.

During the summer, Gospel for Children takes place during the 9:00 a.m. service ONLY.

Children and Eucharist

It is our greatest joy to offer the youngest among us opportunity to experience the love of God and to know what it means to be a part of a worshipping community! All of God’s people, regardless of age, are welcome to receive Holy Eucharist. For families using the Nursery we encourage you to pick your children up from the nursery so they, too may celebrate with us. Our church family just isn’t complete without them!

Children in Service

Children are present and active in many aspects of worship at All Souls, including participation as acolytes, ushers and choir members. At the 9am service, on the 1st and 3rd Sundays children and their parents are welcomed to join the Presiding Priest at the altar, for the Liturgy of the Table.

Choirs

The Catechesis of the Good Shepherd (CGS) is an approach to religious education which honors the "spiritual potential" of the child. Developed by, Biblical scholar Sofia Cavalletti this method follows the belief that even the very youngest child has a religious life. Based on Scripture, Liturgy and the understanding of child development pioneered by Maria Montessori, Catechesis of the Good Shepherd offers the essentials of the Christian Faith in a way that engages and delights children.

Catechesis of the Good Shepherd is divided into three levels that correspond to the Montessori planes of development. Throughout all three levels, the child encounters the essentials of the Faith. All three levels include presentations on the Sacraments, the Bible, Geography, Infancy and Passion Narratives, Prophecies, and Parables in a manner that is developmentally appropriate. The presentations increase in detail and sophistication as the child matures. Our Level I atrium is in its' second year and serving children from Nursery to Kindergarten.

The Good Shepherd Atrium

Level I (Ages 3 – 6)

In Level I the primary focus is the light and life of Christ, the Good Shepherd, who loves his sheep and gives everything for them. The primary aim of the Level I experience is to help children know and enjoy God. We provide guidance and vocabulary to enable them to become aware of God's presence and develop both a conscious and intimate relationship with God. We come to see that it is Jesus, the Good Shepherd who knows his sheep and calls them by their name. It is in Baptism that the Good Shepherd shares His Light and in the Eucharist where we meet the Good Shepherd in a particular way. The enjoyment of the gift of God's own self to the child is the foundation for further religious insight and moral development.

With the older children, **1st through 5th grade** we will use **Weaving God's Promises**. This is a three-year curriculum that weaves Episcopal tradition throughout every lesson, as we transition into Catechesis of the Good Shepherd.

Special programs for Children

During specific times of the year, such as Lent, additional Christian education programs are offered on weeknights, on Saturdays, or on the weekend. Keep an eye on The Connection for current offerings.

Vacation Bible School

All Souls has teamed up with seven other area churches of various denominations in a four day summer VBS called “**Market Place 29 A.D.**” Usually held during the last week of June, “Market Place” is a joyful experience that invites our young to journey through the lively setting of a Judean town market set in the time of Jesus’ ministry. Focusing on a different aspect of the life and times of Jesus each year “Marketplace” offers a varied and multisensory experience for children 3 year olds through 5th grade.

Camp Henry is our summer camp located at Lake Logan Diocesan Camp and Conference Center. Sessions are available throughout the summer, for youth 1st – 12th grade. Sessions include a spiritual element to programming, worship and community living, surrounded by camp activities. Camp Henry is a strong component in the lives of youth in the Diocese. Several of our Cathedral staff members regularly serve as Deans for camp sessions.

Club 45- Beginning January 2013

Calling all 4th & 5th graders! Club 45 is a new ministry of fun, fellowship and service to others. For all 4th and 5th graders of the parish and their friends, Club 45 will meet the fourth Sunday of every month immediately following the Sunday School. Our goal is to have fun and build a loving community as we serve our community. Activities will include hiking, snow tubing, working for Manna Food Bank, cookouts and play in our local parks; plus lots more!

For a glimpse of what the future holds:

At the Cathedral of All Souls we plan to carry The Catechesis of the Good Shepherd through all 3 levels. This will take time and willing hands and hearts to help! If you have carpentry skills, a gift for calligraphy, a call to serve as catechist, or a desire to develop your own faith and understanding of the Episcopal tradition, please contact Micki Hill.

Level II (Ages 6 – 9). The primary focus for Level II is Christ the True Vine, and the History of the Kingdom of God. The child begins to discover the vast cosmic history of God’s plan of salvation and that they have something to contribute to it. Moral sensitivity/awareness begins here and grows with the presentations of Jesus’ maxims, and moral parables. The child’s desire to live in relationship to the Good Shepherd, following his commandment “to love God and love others” flows from the relationship of loving trust that was established in the previous level.

Level III (Ages 9 – 12) The imagination of the older child coupled with his/her concept of time are powerful stimuli to explore the past and the future. The children begin to look at the Plan of God as a plan of communion, a plan which links all people together, past, present, and future. The emphasis is on our response to the unfolding generosity of God and the responsibilities that come with receiving God’s great gifts. “What is the kingdom of God and my place in it?” is a question which begins to lay the foundation for a life’s commitment.

Christian Formation on Sunday Mornings

Formational Education is offered for grades 6-12 at 10:10 in the Warner Building.

All Souls' **Middle School Sunday School** is based on the foundations of the Rite 13 curriculum. Rite 13 supports youth in their own growth and discovery process of their faith as they grow into adults. Based on the passage in Luke 2:42-52 of Jesus in the Temple, "and when he was twelve years old, they went up as usual for the festival. When the festival was ended and they started to return, the boy Jesus stayed behind in Jerusalem.....after three days they found him in the temple, sitting among the teachers, listening to them and asking them questions. And all who heard him were amazed at his understanding and his answers". Rite 13 curriculum echoes this understanding and allows youth to explore the gospel with adult mentors in a fun, safe and affirming environment. Youth are free to question and defend their growing faith, using the three tenets of Anglicanism: Scripture, Reason and Tradition. Many of the lessons help youth understand the structure of different types of prayer used in the Anglican tradition, and how we as Christians are called into society. Youth also learn how their unique talents are all part of God's plan for them.

All Souls' **Confirmation Preparation** is offered to those youth ages 14 and older who have a sense they are being called forward into further engagement in the Episcopal Church. The curriculum offered is *Confirm not Conform*; a rich series of formational activities and exercises that are designed to connect the youth's developmental, spiritual and mental wrestling with our traditions and the community's beliefs and to encourage them to affirm their own personal relationship to the Church and to God. This course is offered ever year and can be repeated by the youth if they wish.

All Souls offers **Independent Study and Discussion** for those youth who have been Confirmed and seek further spiritual development within the context of Sunday School. During this time the youth are supported to look further into what grabs them about our traditions, liturgies, history and the Scriptures. And to look into who they are personally being called to be in service to God, and in the world around them. This group will meet in the village community at 10:10 during Sunday School hour.

EYC and Mission

Being engaged with the world around us and in fellowship with each other as disciples of Christ is the work of our EYC group at Cathedral of All Souls. What we learn about ourselves, God, and the world in our formational classes is put into action during our time together at EYC. EYC meets weekly, Sunday afternoons from 1 – 4pm gathering first at the Cathedral and going out into the world to learn with and serve God's people.

Youth in Worship

Young people are present and active in many aspects of worship at All Souls, including participation as acolytes, chalice bearers, lay readers, ushers and choir members. Our acolytes participate at the annual Diocesan acolyte festival, and also travel to Washington, D.C. to the National Acolyte Festival every three years.

Youth in Music

All Souls also offers opportunities for children and youth to participate in our choir programs.

Cathedral Choir

The Cathedral Choir sings a rich and varied repertoire of choral music, from plainchant and Renaissance motets to anthems by contemporary composers. On occasion, the choir performs large-scale compositions with orchestra. Throughout the year there are special musical opportunities such as the All Souls Service and Taizé liturgies.

The Motet Choir is a smaller group of adult and high school students who come together once a month to rehearse and perform primarily a cappella music. Like the Cathedral Choir, the All Souls Choir sings a rich and varied repertoire of music. The presence of a unique choral group to lead and inspire the music at our energetic 9:00 service is an important element of our music program.

St. Cecilia Choir

Boys and girls 3rd grade through high school are welcome

Rehearsals: Wednesday afternoons, 5:15 – 6:15 p.m.

Sing: Sunday mornings primarily at the 9:00 a.m. Eucharist (occasionally at 11:15 a.m.).

Rehearsals consist of anthem learning, hymn singing, liturgy training, and all around fun! Choristers explore the rich heritage of musical styles in the Episcopal Church, examine the various symbols and traditions of the liturgical year, and learn how to participate more confidently in the worship of their church. The St. Cecilia Choir will occasionally be joined by members of the Motet Choir to sing four-part music!

St. Nicholas Choir

Boys and girls 1st and 2nd grades are welcome

Rehearsals: Wednesday afternoons, 4:15 – 5:00 p.m.

Sing: Sunday mornings primarily at the 9:00 a.m. Eucharist.

The half-hour rehearsals consist of voice building and note reading exercises. Through musical games and echo-singing, choristers build musical confidence and “find their voice.” The St. Nicholas Choir learns music by rote and sings from memory. As a result, choristers are not expected to be able to read music or words. The goal of the St. Nicholas Choir is to prepare choristers to participate fully in the worship of the church and to move confidently into the St. Cecilia Choir.


